BAND DIRECTOR BECOMES PRINCIPAL

It has been announced by Supt. V. M. Bundy of the Madison-Mayodan City Schools, that Mr. Richard Collins will be principal of the Madison Jr. High School next year in addition to his previously held duties as band director of the system. Dick, a graduate of Wake Forest College, is to be congratulated on this expression of confidence as shown by Mr. Bundy and his board.
