Recently it was revealed the Mr. Earl Slocum, director emeritus of the University of North Carolina band, was named president-elect of the American Bandmasters Association at a national convention held in Long Beach, California. Under rules practiced by the group Mr. Slocum will automatically move to the presidency next year. He directed the U.N.C. bands from 1933 until his retirement in 1956. WAKE FOREST ANNOUNCES STRING SCHOLARSHIPS

The Department of Music of Wake Forest College recently announced they are now offering string scholarships to qualified incoming students. The program is being sponsored jointly by the department and the Winston-Salem Symphony Orchestra. Two \$420.00 awards will be granted beginning in the 1961-1962 school year, and are renewable upon satisfactory work for a total of \$1,680,000. The recipients of these awards. which will total eight after a four year period, will perform in the Winston-Salem symphony and the Wake Forest Little Symphony. They need not necessarily be music majors but may study in any curriculum in the college.

Emerson Head of the college music faculty conducts the Little Symphony, and John Iuele is full-time conductor of the Winston-Salem Symphony. The string teachers under this scholarship plan would be Eugene Jacobowski, violin; Miss Ruby Woolf, viola and double bass; and Charles Medlin, cello.
